Tech Time - Contour Sanding

In previous editions, we looked at some smaller options for detail sanding that we offer. Today, we will look at our sanding mops and sanding stars, which are better suited for medium to larger contoured pieces. They each offer various benefits depending on the sanding needs but are assembled and approach the task slightly differently, and offer additional accessory options. Both are made with premium Aluminum Oxide grain on a super flexible J-flex cloth material coated with KLINGSPOR's proprietary multi-bond lubricant.

First, let's look at the Sanding mops. The sanding mops are available in both 4" and 6" diameter options and are cut into strips 1' or 2" in width, based on the specific mop. The strips are perforated with small slits on the end and have a 1/2" hole in the center for stacking back to back on the mandrel. Once you install one pair onto the mandrel, you install the next pair in a crisscross manner. You continue this process until the desired number of strips (thickness) is achieved. As you install the strips, the mops can be made more "fluffy" by adding spacers at random intervals. The final thickness of the mop will be determined by your needs and the specific mandrel you are using. You are only limited by the mandrel length. When a mop wears out, you simply buy refills to replace them and start the process all over again.

Since mops require a mandrel to load them on. We offer them a variety of mandrel sizes and orientation options. We also offer an assortment of accessories like spacers and flanges to change how the mops will impact the aggression and approach to the workpiece. A full video on loading the mops, available accessories, and configurations can be found on our website or YouTube channel or scan the QR code on this page.

Sanding Stars, on the other hand, are pre-loaded onto a mandrel and can't be reloaded. When a star wears out, you toss it (or save it for smaller parts) and grab a new one. Stars are also only available in 4" diameter and when "fluffed" up are approximately 5/8-3/4" thick. These are a great option if you are trying to decide if mops will work for you. I personally use the stars as a primary option in my own shop. The stars are mounted in such a way that the side opposite the mandrel is flat, so you can get into tighter areas than a fully assembled sanding mop on a standard mandrel

So, how does it work? As the strips are broken in, they separate at the perforation and will gently follow the contour of the part being sanded. This makes the mops the ideal sanding solution for nearly all irregular surfaces and shapes that require sanding. This would be great, but not limited to moldings, door profiles, carvings, turned parts like legs and bowls, and the list goes on. They even make great metal cleaners and polishers for things like grill grates, stainless steel parts, and automotive part clean-up. If you sand anything with odd shapes or surfaces, give the Sanding Mops or Stars a try... you won't be disappointed.

Both are made with premium Aluminum Oxide grain on a super flexible J-flex cloth material coated with KLINGSPOR's proprietary multibond lubricant.

The benefit of Klingspor's LS312 material for mops is that the super flexibility and the combination of semi-open coat grain and the multi-bond lubricant make it nearly impossible to load, which makes this material the perfect choice for irregular surface sanding.

Tips for Sanding Mop Set Up & Use

- Place two sheets back to back, see Fig. A
- Crisscross sheets to form a wheel,
- see Fig. B and Fig. C.
 Repeat the pattern until you have 15 to 20 sheets on the arbor, then tighten the nut to held sheet sheat there there.
- hold sheets together.
 Secure the assembly in your drill press, hand held drill, lathe, etc. Be sure to tighten the chuck adequately. Operate at a maximum speed of 2300 RPM, and we strongly suggest you DO NOT exceed this speed.
- Before using the sanding mop on your project, break in the edge by holding a piece of scrap hardwood against it as it spins. This will "soften" the edge so that it doesn't gouge your work.







Customer Spotlight - Charlie Brown

The customer spotlight in this issue has been "spotlighted" before. Some of his work was recently featured on the front of one of our catalogs. He has been woodworking since he was a young man watching his dad work wood as a carpenter at Fort Bragg after World War II. He began by making simple toys from saplings using his dad's hand tools and now does incredible furniture and Marquetry. Meet Charlie Brown.

Q. What is your favorite product to use from Klingspor's Woodworking Shop

A. Klingspor's inventory is gigantic, especially since the Hickory store has doubled in size. I particularly like the large selection of finishes and sanding supplies. The wipe on polyurethane is my favorite and the box of sandpaper cutoffs is always on my list when browsing. The selection of wood, both domestic and exotic, has increased significantly since the store has been remodeled and prices are very reasonable.

Q. What is the most challenging project?

A. Probably, the most challenging project I have attempted was a Roubo workbench I built several years ago. The table top has sliding dovetail leg connections and pegged leg bracing. Construction required all the joinery to be connected simultaneously. Some of the surfaces were glued or epoxied and I can now affirm the validity of the adage "One Never Have Too Many Clamps". I am also a believer in delayed setting adhesives. The project came together but not without considerable effort.

Q. What is your favorite project?

A. My favorite project and the one I take the most satisfaction in is the Federal Period side table pictured below. It was a project I really enjoyed doing for several reasons. It incorporated joinery, marquetry, inlays, and finishing that really produced a nice-looking, functional table.

Q. What tips can you share with us?

A. A couple of tips come to mind that may be of use to my fellow woodworkers.

- Listen to and question other woodworkers that you admire and respect. They have your admiration for good reason. Put their experience to work for you and share what you glean with others.

- Don't neglect air quality in your shop. My dad suffered from respiratory problems for a long time. It's something I think about often.

Q. How did you get into woodworking?

A. I started making sawdust seriously after my wife and I started a family and bought our first house. There was always a need for cabinets, shelving, toys, etc., and I started making a few pieces of furniture. I also built my first backyard workshop and began buying a few power tools. Combined with the tools Dad left me, I had a fairly functional small shop. After our move to Hickory over fifteen years ago, I immediately became involved in several of the woodworking clubs and served on several club boards. Most of the friends I have today are woodworkers I met on Saturdays at Klingspor's Woodworking Shop.

Q. What are your top 5 most tools used?

A. The tools I use most have to be the table saw, bandsaw, router table, planer and hand tools. I still get an immense amount of satisfaction in making tools and jigs and moving things around in the shop to make work easier and more efficient.

Q. What would you like to try next?

A. Next on my list is an office desk. The one I am currently using has a built-in recess for a monitor and other hardware. My new equipment doesn't fit as well as I would like so, a new project is born.

Q. How does the typical day start for you in the shop?

A. I am seldom without a project in the shop and am an early riser so I'm usually in the shop by 8:00 or so. Typically, I have a sketch or idea jotted down from a day or two before I start. That way, if you're OCD like me, you get to spend most of the night before thinking about what you missed or think you should change. This also allows me to gather materials for the project so that once the project is underway, I can proceed without interruption. Ideas for projects come from many sources. My wife is seldom without a request for something for the house or our kids or grandchildren. Woodworking clubs typically have a portion of the monthly meeting dedicated to "Show and Tell". This is a great opportunity to see what others are creating and to ask questions about how the project was made and tips for making one yourself. Some of my most recent projects include wooden recipe boxes, basement shelving and drawers, marquetry pictures, and a small side table.







Vendor Spotlight - Arbortech

Q. What is your bestselling product or what is your company most known for?

A. The Ball Gouge and the Turbo Plane are our top sellers. Arbortech is most known for the Turbo Plane.

Q. What is the most surprising item that has sold well?

A. The Allsaw was originally designed as a tree-cutting tool in Western Australia. It turned out to be a great match for removing mortar and other commercial US applications.




In the fourth and final installment of our tips on "Burning a Signature," we consider the importance of... Burn Slow and Steady


In addition to the setting on the temperature dial, how fast or slow you burn determines

the color of the burn. If you burn very fast, the burn will be very light in color because any given point on the burn line does not have enough burn time to get dark. Most adults have a tempo when writing their signature—usually starting out slower and then quickly speeding up before the end. When burning a signature using this tempo, the result is a name that starts out dark and ends too light. The solution is to burn

using the same speed throughout the signature. Until this becomes second nature, try writing the signature in pencil and trace it like a pattern, concentrating on keeping the speed the same throughout the signature.
